The primary in Marlboro township this Saturday afternoon will no doubt instruct its delegates for T. B. B. Brown for State Senator; D. M. Crafer for Burgoess, and Jacob Shultz for Sheriff. The delegates will probably be John D. Home, D. P. VanVorn and H. V. M. Dennis.

The Prohibitionists of Ocean county held their convention at Eatons on the 15th inst. An expression in favor of Gov. Fisk for the Presidency next year was universal. They nominated County and Assembly candidates and passed resolutions in earnest advocacy of prohibition as a third party movement.

Ocean township has three Democratic aspirants for the nomination for Coroner, to succeed Wm. T. VanWert. They are Constable Wm. E. VanDyke, City Clerk Fred Vanderveer and Edward I. Pletcher. It would be hard for Ocean to present a man, if it were her turn, that could more acceptably fill the office, and with economy to the county, than has the present Coroner in that township.

The Democrats of Warren county have nominated ex-Mayor Cornish, of Washington in that county, for Senator; Elihu Hoover for the Assembly in the 1st district, and Samuel McFelder in the 2d. Speaker Wm. M. Baird, who so bitterly antagonized Leon Abbett for U. S. Senator last winter, will run as an independent candidate in the 1st district, and it is said Leon Abbett will stump the district against him.
